Other light and bright colors will work and we will make samples with a variety of colors. Bring a variety of light colors if you have them. Some will be provided.

Note: Tencel works beautifully and has a nice luster. Silk was used traditionally and takes the dye beautifully, but is more expensive.

Cotton works well. Wool gives softer lines. Feel free to experiment with others. 8/2 gives a nice amount of detail. You can choose to work with finer such as 10/2 but not much heavier than 5/2.

Pencils, 3 colors Ruler Scissors

2 warping stands with clamps.

Sides of a warping board can also be used or a commercial tying stand. See photos below to see how they are used. After winding the weft on pegs it will be transferred to a tying frame.

Tying frame: A picture frame with dowel rods for tying with screw eyelets that will hold a dowel rod. You can easily make a frame of your own. It should be no less than made with 12 x 18 inch stretcher bars or a similar size solid frame. The stretcher bars make a frame that can be taken apart and are easier to store.

2 eye bolts are needed. Size depends on the dowel rod used. Dowel rods of 3/8 inch work well. ¹/₄ inch may bend under strain but are usable. 2 dowel rods are needed. 1 wider than the width of the frame & 1 dowel rod to fit inside the frame. See pictures below.

1/2 yard fabric or 2 18 x 18 inch fabric squares. Light weight wool or blend, woven or knit is best. (Recycled works well, check skirts and coats at thrift stores!)

Optional: Garment to work directly on. Can be knit or woven, recycled sweaters work well. Avoid garments with linings or open seems to work around the lining. Wool and wool blends are the easiest to felt on but handwovens of any fiber can be used. Very tightly woven fabrics, commercial or handwoven, are more difficult.

We will be learning to make pre-felt panels that can be moved so you can "Try it" before applying it to something precious like a handwoven top. Novelty yarns or locks for accents: optional

scissors for fabric and paper. wool felting needles: 5-10 each small, medium and large single needle holder, optional but very useful holder for multiple needles (often hold 5 to 8 needles) optional but very useful finger cots (protectors) optional needle felting pad, foam or wool straight pins, tapestry needle pencil pictures of scenery, i.e. sunsets, mountains, flowers, trees

- 19-21 micron Merino wool top...*please make sure that it is not Superwash Merino which will not felt.* You will have time to make up to two hats in our time together, so bring your stash. My hats range in weight between 2.5 ounces to 6 ounces each. *Living Felt* has a beautiful assortment of Merino wools.*
- Optional embellishments: lightweight silk fabric (chiffon, etc.) for nuno-felted hats, lightweight beaded silk fabrics, silk fibers, silk hankies. I love repurposing vintage beaded silk clothing found at thrift shops, eBay, etc., and will show you how I incorporate those in my hat-making...be on the lookout and do check the label to make sure that the garment is silk and that the silk base is lightweight. *Living Felt* has a beautiful assortment of the embellishing fibers, as well as solid color silk fabrics, as well as colorful silk sari fabrics that nuno-felt very nicely.*
- One Polystyrene (*Styrofoam*) floral wreath, smooth, round edge, 12-inch (30-31cm.) diameter (the color does not matter). Available in most craft stores.
- Several old bath size towels and a plastic bag to put wet towels in.
- Bubble wrap (*small bubbles*), minimum size of 2 ft. wide x 6 ft. length. *This can be* purchased through Living Felt* by the foot or a roll can be purchased at Walmart or Home Depot/Menards in their packing supplies section.
- I will be providing flexible laminate material for two patterns in your materials fee. If you wish to copy additional patterns, please bring large sheets of craft paper or pattern tracing paper.
- A plastic bucket or plastic bowl (mixing bowl) for water...available at most dollar stores if you don't wish to bring your good mixing bowls.
- Olive oil soap or your favorite soap for felting. Olive oil soap is available at Living Felt* and is very mild on your hands.

People often ask me if weaving with wire hurts my hands. My reply is noit's a lot like weaving anything else! I CAN stab myself with the needle when I am assembling jewelry or a sculpture, but the wire doesn't attack me when I am weaving. Once you understand how to work with this lively material, the weaving process is very straightforward and enjoyable!

This Weaving with Wire workshop will focus on weaving a narrow, 3 yard warp. I will take you through the steps from planning your warp to creating something unique with the woven metal fabric. I am very excited to share the love I have of weaving with wire and can't wait to see what YOU create!

You will plan, create, beam and tie on a 3 yard wire warp.

You will weave the warp, experimenting with different weft materials.

You will create a woven metal fabric and fashion into jewelry or a small sculpture.

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- 4 or 8 shaft floor or table loom
- 10, 12 or 15 dent reed (the warp is sett at 60 epi)
- Warping board or reel
- Packing paper for rolling on warp
- Pair of sticks long enough to reach from front beam to back beam
- · Clamps/bungee cords to secure warping & lease sticks to loom
- Lease sticks A second pair is nice you can can make a second pair easily by drilling holes in dowel sticks so you can tie them
- Sley hook and reed hook

I have found a wonderful supplier of wire that is 28 gauge and comes in 30 colors! It is very reasonable at about \$8.25 per 200 or 300' spool. We will be using the wire for the warp, and it will also be wound along with the novelty yarn for the weft.

You are each going to put on a 3 yard warp and you can choose the width of your warp -3/8", $\frac{1}{2}$ " or 1". I've included some images of jewelry I've made with the widths listed so you can get an idea of what it will do. I'll have designs I've created for you to make if you like, but will love seeing what designs you can come up with! Don't stress too much about your finished design - we are going to play!

For a 3/8" wide, 3 yd warp sett at 60 epi you will need approx. 450' For a ½" wide, 3 yd warp sett at 60 epi you will need approx. 500' For a 1" wide, 3 yd warp sett at 60 epi you will need approx. 1000' (you can order additional colors to make a striped warp or use for different wefts if your budget allows. So many colors to choose from!)

Most Mirrix looms work great, but not the Safron loom or any loom equipped with the comb that Mirrix sells, it will fray your warp. Rigid heddle looms are also a possibility.

Students should warp their looms prior to the workshop:

Looms: 4 harness floor and table looms are best. Rigid heddle and other looms are discouraged. **Warp pattern:** Warp for a plain weave structure. Use 4 shafts if you want to experiment with twill and pick-and-pick in addition to plain weave.

Warp: 16/1 linen sett at 15-16 epi, or 16/2 linen sett at 12 epi.

Your warp can be any color. Light colors are less transparent because they reflect more light. Mid to dark values are better at disappearing. For an extra kick, try space dyeing your warp! Width of warp should be 12 to 15 inches wide. Use a double warp for selvedges. Warp length of 2 or 3 yards will be adequate for sampling and weaving a complete piece.

Warp yardage needed = epi x width of warp x length of warp.

Ground weft: same or similar linen color as warp. It is a balanced weave, so ground weft yardage needed = epi x width x length of weaving.

Inlay/pattern weft: Any fiber will work. Yarn similar in size to 10/2 or 5/2 cotton would work well. Fine yarns can be doubled. Inlay weft yardage needed will vary depending on your design and length of weaving.

Tools: bring your usual weaving tools with you, including a boat shuttle for ground weft. Inlay wefts can be on tapestry bobbins or in butterflies.

Workshop Instructions and Supply List

The workshop *A Parallel Threading is the Weaver's Playground* is an on-loom workshop that is a combination of weaving, presentations, and discussion. During this workshop, we will explore the possibilities in color and treadling variations of a parallel threading – from echo weaves and corkscrew twills to turned taqueté and network-drafted twills. You will warp your floor or table loom prior to the workshop and weave only on your own loom during the workshop.

I encourage workshop participants to use materials they already have on hand. The warping instructions for this workshop specify 5/2 cotton, 8/2 cotton, 8/2 Tencel[®], and 10/2 cotton; however, if you would like to substitute a yarn you already have, please contact me so we can adjust the sample set-up accordingly.

Supply list

- Pre-warped loom, with a minimum of four shafts, set-up per the warping instructions on the following pages. Please feel free to warp your loom wider and/or longer than the minimum specified.
- Wefts in the same size as your warp
 - Same as the two colors in the warp
 - At least two colors different from the warp colors (Instructor will also have colors available in 5/2 and 10/2 cotton)
- Two shuttles, preferably with extra bobbins
- Scissors
- Pen/pencil and paper to take notes

I highly recommend that you mark the items you bring (e.g., shuttles, scissors, etc.) since it will help identify anything that may stray or get left behind.

Come prepared to learn and have fun. I'm looking forward to sharing with you my enthusiasm for parallel threadings and the amazing possibilities. It's not uncommon to run out of warp before you run out of ideas. If you have any questions about the workshop or about sample instructions, please feel free to contact me.

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Warp and Weft Selection

Warp colors: Color is important with a parallel threading. For each threading, you will need two different warp colors that contrast in value. *This means one must be dark and one must be light.*

Comments about selecting colors:

- The greatest contrast in value is black and white; however, using a dark and a light color will allow for greater exploration of color interaction.
- Colors do not have to be from the same hue. Possible warp combinations could include dark purple and light blue, burgundy and light apricot, dark blue and pale green, etc.
- Variegated yarns should be avoided for the workshop.
- Warp: There are two threadings to choose from on the following pages . . . one four- shaft threading and one eight-shaft threading. The setts shown below are more of a suggestion than a rule. The type of project you may choose to do in the future may require a slightly different sett to achieve the desired results.

Warp and Sett

Yarn	Sett
5/2 cotton	20-24 epi
8/2 cotton	26-28 epi
8/2 Tencel® or 10/2 cotton	30-32 epi

Width - 6" to 8" inches (this is a recommended *minimum* . . . but, you may make your warp as wide as you like)

Length of warp (this is a recommended **minimum** . . . but, you may make your warp as long as you like)

- Three yards for table looms
- Four yards for floor looms

Wefts:

Wefts required for the different treadlings

- Same yarn in color and size as the warp yarns
- At least two wefts the same size as the warp in contrasting colors (instructor will have wefts available to augment the color possibilities)
- Any other yarns in your stash you would like to experiment with
- At least two shuttles. Stick shuttles are fine. Extra bobbins for boat shuttles are encouraged.

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Parallel warp threading for four-shaft looms

Below is a four-shaft parallel threading. The threading requires the same number of heddles on each staff. Therefore, when you know the yarn, sett, and width of the warp, take the total number of warp ends and divide by four. This will give you the heddle count for each shaft.

If you're unsure which warp colors to use, you are welcome to use different warp color combinations. If you choose to do this, it is highly recommended to thread each two-color warp combination for a minimum of one full threading repeat. In other words, don't change the warp color combination in the middle of a threading repeat. This will help add clarity to the pattern.

Four-shaft parallel twill threading: one repeat = 60 ends (30 ends - dark, 30 ends - light)



Tie-up - For the first part of the workshop, the tie-up shown to the right will be used. If you have a floor loom with more than four treadles, tie-up two of the treadles with one treadle tied to shafts one and three and the other treadle tied to shafts two and four. Later in the workshop, changes to the tie-up will made.

If you're unsure which warp colors to use, you are welcome to use different warp color combinations. Tie-up - For the first part of the workshop, the tie-up shown to the right will be used. If you have a floor loom with more than eight treadles, tie-up two of the treadles with one treadle tied to shafts one, three, five, and seven and the other treadle tied to shafts two, four, six, and eight. Later in the workshop, changes to the tie-up can be made.
